


Frosh Graduation Rates, 2010–2019 Cohorts


6-Year Rate 4-Year Rate




Frosh Grad Rates by Demographics










The frosh 4-year graduation rate showed a decline from the previous year's peak: 64.2% of first-time, full-time frosh who entered in Fall 2019 graduated within four years, down 1.1 percentage points relative to the previous cohort. Rates remained relatively steady among traditionally underrepresented student populations, with drops in 4-year rates for low-income students (down 1.2 percentage points from the previous cohort) and underrepresented minority students (down 0.4 points) and a small increase for first-generation students (up 0.4 points).

The 6-year graduation rate for frosh increased slightly from the previous year, with 76.5% of Fall 2017 entrants graduating within six years, up by 0.5 percentage points relative to the prior cohort. The rate has remained within a narrow range of 76.0% to 77.3% across the past five successive cohorts. The UC 2030 goal for UCR's frosh 6-year graduation rate is 85%.









Graduation Rate Overview — 2023 Fall Transfer Cohorts

Transfer Graduation Rates, 2012–2021 Cohorts




Transfer Rates by Demographics









Undergraduate transfer graduation rates remain below the peak levels achieved by the 2014 entering cohort. Among the most recent cohorts, the 2-year rate of 60.5% for Fall 2021 entrants represented a notable increase of 6.2 percentage points relative to the preceding cohort, and the 4-year rate of 85.9% for the Fall 2019 cohort showed an increase of 1.0 percentage points from the previous year's rates.

Equity gaps remain relatively small among transfer students. For low-income students, first-generation students, and underrepresented minority students, 4-year rates were all within 1 percentage point of their counterparts. Gaps in 2-year rates were somewhat wider, with a 4-point gap for underrepresented minority students and low-income students and a 2-point gap for first-generation students. The UC 2030 goal for UCR's transfer 4-year graduation rate is 93%.
